Mary Elizabeth Froustet - Teacher and Mathematics Leader

Mary Elizabeth Froustet was a high school and college teacher and a leader in mathematics education for over 60 years. Her close friends knew her as "Betty Lou" who was born in 1922. Mary was not only a close friend of many of us but was a great inspiration and mentor which led to the development of many new leaders in AMTNJ and NCTM.

Mary's initial teaching degree was from Chestnut Hill College in 1943 and her masters degree was from Fordham University in 1948. Mary began teaching mathematics in the Union Township Schools. One of her colleagues at Union was Gloria Sanok who later became internationally known in her own right in mathematics teaching and writing.

Later on in her career, Mary Froustet taught college mathematics and teacher education courses at Caldwell College and Kean College until her retirement.

Mary was very involved in AMTNJ and NCTM activities during her lifetime. She served at every elected position for AMTNJ and also many committees and was AMTNJ President #57 from 1970-1971. Mary was a member of the NCTM Board of Directors from1975-1978 and served as chair of several NCTM committees including the Committee on the Teaching of Mathematics in Urban Schools.
